How to support mask wearing

COVID-19 worker supports

We all share accountability for creating a workplace where people feel safe, healthy and valued. This begins by talking about respect and safety and doing the right thing to protect ourselves and each other.

Our top priority is to ensure the health and well-being of all Albertans. That includes standing up for safety, being alert for hazards and speaking up, and sharing safety knowledge with others.

AHS requires mask wearing

- All staff, physicians and volunteers are required to continuously mask in areas where they may come into contact with patients or designated family/support persons (e.g. patient care areas, elevators/staircases/ hallways, common areas, gift shops, cafeterias).
- Wearing a mask is optional for staff, physicians and volunteers in areas that are not accessible to patients or family (e.g. staff break rooms/meeting rooms, corporate settings, health records departments, vacant clinical sites).
- If a patient is *unable to wear a mask* for medical or other reasons, please engage the health care team to work collaboratively with them to find the most appropriate and safest solution for the situation.

You may see patients, clients, visitors or colleagues not wearing a mask for medical or other reasons. You can encourage mask wearing by staying calm and respectful, and showing kindness. *Ask. Listen. Share. Connect.*

Here are some steps to a safe and respectful conversation:

Step 1: Ask and Listen

Be open and curious. Try to understand the other person's perspective.

- "I noticed you are not wearing a mask today. Can I ask why?" or
- "Help me to understand why you are not wearing a mask today?"



Step 2: Share and Connect

Show empathy:

• "That sounds really difficult. I have felt that way at times as well."

Step 3: Share your safety knowledge

Once you have an understanding, explain why wearing a mask is important.

• "AHS requires mask wearing in areas accessible to patients or designated family/support persons along with hand washing, and staying home when we're not feeling well to protect each other."





How to support mask wearing (cont'd)

Step 4: Work towards possible solutions	
Possible reasons	Possible responses
1. Lost or broken mask	Offer them a new one.
2. Uncomfortable to wear	"Have you tried?"
	 applying moisturizer to your face first adjusting the fit on the nose twisting the elastics to adjust the position, using extenders or ear savers
	You could offer an alternate mask which may be more comfortable.

3. Anxious or claustrophobic	"I've heard chewing gum can help" or " <i>Taking</i> <i>deep breaths</i> can help. Try slowing counting five breaths, in through your nose and out your mouth."
4. "I'm not sick"	Explain asymptomatic transmission.
	"You can transmit COVID-19 even when you don't have symptoms. That is why we must continuously mask in areas accessible to patients or designated family/support persons."
5. Masks aren't effective	"Wearing a mask is one of the most effective ways to protect each other from COVID-19, along with physical distancing, hand washing and staying home when we're not feeling well."

If a person is still hesitant to wear a mask, remember the best way to protect yourself at work is your use of appropriate Personal Protective Equipment (PPE).

- *No patient shall be denied service* in AHS because they cannot or will not wear a mask.
- If staff safety is otherwise at risk (e.g. because of harassing or violent behaviours), get help and/or leave if possible. Engage your leader, Protective Services or activate the appropriate emergency response code.
- If you are concerned about a co-worker not wearing a mask, talk to your leader.
